About Pitch and Putt: Pitch and Putt is an amateur sport, similar to golf. The maximum hole length for international competitions is 90 metres with a maximum total course length of 1,200 metres. Players may only use one iron and a putter. The game is played from raised artificial teeing surfaces using a tee and it has its own handicap system.

Established: Pitch and Putt was offered as a development sport for the 2003 Special Olympics World Summer Games and continues to be offered in the Special Olympics Ireland programme only.

Differences of Special Olympics Pitch and Putt: Pitch and Putt is offered up to and including Special Olympics Ireland Games only.

All athletes are given an equal chance to participate, perform, and be recognized for doing their best by their teammates, family, friends, and fans.
