Joseph "Joe-Joe" Sheehan, 21, from Doneraile, County Cork, has made a huge impact since joining Mallow United Special Olympics Club four years ago, earning two gold, two silver, and two bronze medals at regional and Ireland Games. Active in floorball, golf, and football, Joseph thrives on fitness and purpose—qualities driving him as part of Team Ireland for Turin! His advice? "Be kind, believe in yourself, respect coaches, train hard, and always enjoy the journey while having fun!"

Frank O'Dwyer, 30, from Ballylandis, County Limerick, has been with Tipperary Special Olympics Club for 12 years, winning 10 medals in basketball, swimming, athletics, football, and floorball with Team Munster and Team Ireland. A fan of Manchester United, Limerick hurling, and Munster rugby, he enjoys cinema and socialising. His advice: "Be a good team leader, support each other, and respect coaches and volunteers—they make it possible."





20 year old **Gavin Bourke**, from Doneraile, County Cork, is a powerhouse at Mallow United Special Olympics Club, dominating both floorball and football for the past four years. After securing gold at the Ireland Winter Games in Armagh, he's hungry for more, setting his sights on a World Games medal! Fiercely passionate about floorball, Gavin trains relentlessly with his team. A true Manchester United fan, he also loves footgolf. His advice to young athletes? "Believe in yourself, and never stop pushing!"

James Upton, (Goal Keeper) 42, from Passage East, in Waterford, has proudly represented Waterford Special Olympics Club for over 20 years, Excelling in floorball, soccer, and basketball. Highlights include the Ireland Games in Dublin (2002) and Belfast (2006), a silver medal in basketball at the 2010 Limerick Games, and representing Ireland in floorball at the 2017 World Winter Games in Austria—a dream come true! Now, James eagerly gears up for the 2025 World Winter Games in Turin, determined to give it his all.





Jack Buckley (Goal Keeper), from Mallow, Cork, has been competing in floorball for 2 years, and has already made his mark as part of a gold-winning team in the 2024 Ireland Winter Games. The 20-year-old started with Mallow United Special Olympics Club just four years ago, and has been active across badminton, football and basketball as well as floorball. His advice to fellow athletes is "focus, focus, and focus!"

Damien Kirwan, 38, from Waterford City has been a proud member of Special Olympics Waterford, for over 12 years. A major highlight was when Damien was awarded his first Irish Cap for representing Ireland at the Special Olympics World Games in Los Angeles (2015) by Waterford and Irish Football legend Alfie Hale. Damien's athletic career reflects his love of sport generally, and football in particular as he is a major fan of Man United. His advice to his fellow athletes is "Keep going and going!"

James Hunter, 29 from Mallow, County Cork, is a Special Olympics stalwart, having competed successfully for 14 years across numerous sports. A highlight of his athletic career was winning bronze in seven-a-side football at the 2019 Abu Dhabi World Summer Games, but this is just one of around 30 awards he's received, including a "Sportsman of the Year" award. He can't wait to represent Ireland on the floorball court in Turin, and his advice for athletes is to "train hard, put in the time and dedication to sport and teamwork".





Niall Corcoran, a proud native of Ballinahassig, County Cork, has been a dedicated member of the Waterford Special Olympics team for some years. Although this marks Niall's debut at a World Games event, his exceptional defensive abilities and impressive shooting skills make him a standout competitor to watch. Thrilled to represent Team Ireland, Niall is overjoyed to embark on this exciting journey to the World Games in Turin, where he's eager to showcase his talents and face off against top international contenders.

George Fitzgerald (Assistant Coach), Kilkenny an athlete and now Assistant Coach at Waterford Special Olympics Club, brings a wealth of experience to his role. He proudly represented Ireland at the 2013 South Korea Games and secured a bronze medal at the 2010 European Games. As the captain of the Irish floorball team, he led his teammates at the 2017 Games in Austria. Additionally, George has been a dedicated basketball player for Waterford Club since 2003 and has achieved coaching and refereeing qualifications through Basketball Ireland in 2017. He is excited and honored to support Team Ireland as Assistant Coach in Turin this March, and his extensive background makes him an exceptional mentor for the athletes.

Lorraine Whelan, 43 from Delgany, Co. Wicklow is a seasoned Special Olympics athlete with 25 years of dedication to skiing and swimming. She has proudly represented Ireland in alpine skiing at four World Winter Games and competed in swimming at the 2014 European Games, earning an impressive medal collection. In 2018 she had a terrible car accident that put her ability to ski in great jeopardy. She has bravely and slowly fought her way back to this impressive level! Balancing her career at Bank of Ireland with fitness and travel, she's energized and ready to take on her next big challenge!

Lucy Best, 32, from Ballinderry Co. Antrim, has been tearing up the slopes since she was 10, competing in Special Olympics for 12 years. A bronze medalist in South Korea (2013) and double silver winner at the 2023 European Ski Championships, she loves the thrill of skiing and meeting new athletes. Off the slopes, Lucy enjoys rugby, horses, cats, and sheep rounding on her quad bike. Her advice? "Skiing is amazing—give it a try, and you'll love the coaches!"





Caolan McConville, 21, from Aghagallon, Co. Antrim, has his sights set on gold as one of Ireland's top skiing talents. He began skiing at age nine and made waves at the 2017 Winter Games, where he progressed from novice to intermediate level and earned both a silver and a bronze medal. At just 13 years old, he was Ireland's youngest competitor and proudly carried the Irish flag. Now 21, Caolan is ready to take on the 2025 Winter Games, competing in the Slalom and Giant Slalom events. All eyes will be on this determined young athlete!

Clive Healy, 30 from Waterford City, is a Special Olympics veteran, a part of Waterford Special Olympics club for the last 15 years - he has achieved 100 medals, including golds in football and floorball when competed at the World Winter Games in Austria in 2017. A multi-sport star, he's dominated darts for four years and earned accolades in skiing. Thrilled to represent Ireland in Turin, Clive balances his love of sports with socialising. His advice for athletes? "Work hard, respect others, and never give up. Stay positive, give it your all, and you can achieve greatness in any sport!"

Maire Connelly, 20, from Clarinbridge, Galway, is set to make her mark at the World Winter Games in Turin! Maire travels weekly to the Kilternan Karvers Special Olympics Club. A member since 2016 Maire has really made her mark, and is fresh off winning two golds in alpine skiing at the 2024 Ireland Winter Games. Though this is her debut at the Winter Worlds, she's no stranger to success—earning one gold and three bronzes in artistic gymnastics at the 2023 World Summer Games in Berlin. Fueled by her favorite tunes from Westlife and One Direction, Maire's motto for fellow athletes is simple: "Don't be afraid; just do it!"





Donal Brennan, 24, from Ballinteer, Dublin, began skiing at age 7 on a family holiday in Germany. A year later, he joined Kilternan Karvers Special Olympics Club and has excelled ever since. He won gold and silver at the Ireland Winter Games in 2012, 2021, and 2024, and also at the 2020 Switzerland National Winter Games. Donal has also earned medals in swimming, golf, and athletics at the Ireland Summer Games in 2014, and 2018. Selected for the 2023 World Winter Games in Kazan, Russia (later cancelled), his advice to athletes is: "Enjoy the preparations, get to know your team, practice hard, stay confident, and have fun!"




Strength in Mind as Well as Body

With the countdown to the World Games well underway, Team Ireland is training hard, staying focused, and ready to take on the world!




